The DfE's guidance states that school attendance will be "mandatory for all pupils from March 8".



The usual rules on attendance will apply, including parents' legal duty to secure their child's attendance at school.

The ability to issue sanctions such as fines will also be reinstated, and schools will be responsible for recording attendance, following up absence and "reporting children missing education to the local authority".

At the beginning of this new term, I would just like to take this opportunity to thank Ms Jarrett and all of the amazing staff team at Veryan for all of their hard work and dedication to make learning possible during a very challenging spring term.

As you might remember, schools were back for one day after the Christmas holidays when another lockdown was announced that evening with immediate effect. Despite being given no notice, the staff were prepared and ready the next morning to provide on site education for key worker children with remote learning resources provided for all other pupils at home. This situation of course lasted until the middle of March. To keep both of these learning strategies running concurrently and smoothly with staff unable to meet together except electronically was a very demanding situation, but one in which the staff team in Veryan deserve a great deal of credit in rising to the challenge.

Census Day—Special menu



On Thursday 20th May there is a special menu in honour of school census day:

Pasty, chips and beans

Or

Cheese and onion pasty, chips and beans

(Gluten free menu option: Gluten free sausage)

Or the usual packed lunch and jacket potato options will be available as usual.

If you already ordered a meal prior to Friday 30th April this will have been deleted by Parentpay when the amendment was made on the menu options and so will need to be rebooked with the new choices.

What is Census Day?

Census Day is when Local Authorities collect information electronically from every school in their area. This is, in part, to guide them in planning and funding. The LA collect details such as pupil numbers, numbers of pupils with Special Educational Needs, those entitled to Pupil Premium funding, those entitled to Free School Meals (FSM), attendance information and so forth.

Why is it important? Do I need to do anything?

To maximise our school's potential funding, we would encourage all families with children entitled to FSM to order their free meal on Thursday 20th May. It is the number of children in Early Years and Key Stage 1 eating the free meal on the actual day's lunchtime that informs the funding, rather than all meals ordered for that day or children attending school. Pupils who bring a packed lunch from home unfortunately are not included, nor are children who normally take Universal Infant Free School Meals, that are absent on 20th May.

We would encourage as many children as possible to commit to eating their FSM on 20th May; this will record those children as having eaten on Census Day and therefore count towards the total Government funding allocated to our school for UIFSM for a whole year. Hopefully, it will also encourage any children who don't normally take the meals to join us for lunch and lead to more of them eating over the rest of the school year!

But my child is eligible for Universal Free School Meals, so it doesn't matter if I don't apply for Free School Meals....

All Key Stage 1 (Reception, Year 1 and Year 2) children get free school meals, regardless of what benefits are being claimed. This is part of the Universal Infant Free School Meals (UIFSM) initiative.

Some of these children might be able to get benefits-related Free School Meals. Children in this group are also eligible for pupil premium. This is funding paid to the school to support your child in their learning. It is important to apply for benefits-related Free School Meals if you think you fit this criteria.

The settings on an Android device allow you to prescribe certain rules for when your child is using it. For example, you can block specific types of content to reduce the risk of your child being exposed to age-inappropriate material (music with explicit lyrics, for instance, and games, TV shows or movies that are unsuitable for young people). There are two ways to access parental controls on an Android phone: through Google Play or via the Google Family Link app. You can also lock your changes behind a PIN, so your child (or anyone else) can't change them back.











The parental controls on iPhones allow you to block or restrict certain apps, features, content, downloads, or our chases. Setting limitations on content ratings, Siri and web searches enables you to filter out age-inapproprial content and vastly reduce the likelihood of your children being exposed to unsuitable material and information. purchas








Set up content 18+ rating restrictions

Content filters keep your child from viewing unsuitable material. They block apps, films and TV shows with specific age ratings, and music and podcasts with explicit content.











